"The WV Legislature needs to rely on education professionals in regards to our education standards, curriculum, and assessments. Our public schools need resources for our classrooms, support for all school employees and stability in education. Constant change drains resources we desperately need to educate our children," Campbell said.

On Thursday during 2nd reading in the House, the House amended the bill, reinserting language that would block next school year's implementation of new science standards that require teaching students about global warming and removing

"Common Core instructional strategies" by 2017-18. <u>Committee Substitute for HB 4014</u> passed the House on Friday.

Senate amends and advances tobacco tax to fund PEIA

Last week, the Senate Finance Committee amended and advanced SB 420, a bill designed to raise the state's tobacco tax by \$1 and fund the PEIA deficit. SB 420 was passed this week by the full Senate and now awaits action by the House of Delegates.

Over 230,000 West Virginians will be hurt by the \$120 million in proposed PEIA benefit cuts unless a funding stream is passed by the legislature. Please continue to contact your representatives and ask them to fix and fund PEIA by supporting SB 420.

Salary Equity Bill would result in pay cut for service personnel

<u>HB 4465</u> proposes to eliminate the current calculation for salary equity for school service personnel. By eliminating the current calculation, the legislature will be cutting \$6 million from hard working service personnel across West Virginia. The bill was on 2nd reading, but was removed from the House floor. The bill appears to have stalled but could regain momentum at any moment. **AFT-WV opposes HB 4465.**

Two School Calendar bills active

AFT-WV supports school calendars that provide thorough instructional time and allow local communities to develop calendars to fit their unique needs. <u>Engrossed Committee Substitute for SB 313</u> changes mandatory school instructional time from 180 days to minutes and permits limited use of available accrued instructional time. The bill passed the Senate and awaits action by the House. <u>HB 4171</u> calls for a school year that begins no earlier than August 10 and completes by June 10. It also permits the use of accrued instructional minutes to makeup up 8 days lost to inclement weather. The bill has passed the House and awaits action by the Senate.

Lesson Plans Online

<u>SB 681</u> provides teachers' lessons plans be available on the Internet to student and parents. The bill was in the Senate Education agenda on Thursday but did not consider the bill due to time. Over 20,000 people have viewed the SB 681 action item on AFT-WV's Facebook page! Keep calling and emailing until they pull this bad bill! **AFT-WV opposes SB 681.**

Charter Schools dead according to Senate Majority Leader

Republican Majority Leader Senator Mitch Carmichael told the Associated Press on Tuesday that lawmakers won't pass a bill to allow charter schools in West Virginia during this session. AFT-WV remains vigilant, as anything can happen with 15 days remaining in session. **AFT-WV opposes HB 4011.**
