<u>House leaders continue to ignore PEIA, Finance Committee rejects</u> Senate's PEIA fix

Last week, SB 420 was passed by the full Senate to raise the tobacco tax by \$1 to fully fund the PEIA shortfall and avoid potential employee premium increases. Yesterday, the House Finance Committee amended the bill to a 45 cent tax increase. Ultimately, the committee didn't pass the watered down version of the bill, leaving a \$120 million hole in the budget with no other funding alternatives to address the shortfall. With one week to go in the 2016 Legislative Session, the House turned their backs on 230,000 West Virginians who depend on PEIA for affordable health care coverage. Please continue to contact House members and ask them to fix and fund PEIA and by reconsidering SB 420.

Retaliatory bill strips union representation from PEIA Board

SB 622 would change the composition of the Public Employees Insurance Agency Finance Board. The bill passed the Senate Wednesday on a party line 18-16 vote. SB 622 would reconfigure the board, which each year must approve PEIA health care benefits packages for public employees and retirees. The board would shrink from 10 to eight members; a union representative and an atlarge citizen member would be removed from the current board. SB 622 awaits action by the House. AFT-WV opposes SB 622.

Common Core

AFT-WV maintains the WV Legislature should rely on education professionals in regards to our education standards, curriculum, and assessments. Our students and educators need continuity and stability to improve achievement.

<u>Committee Substitute for HB 4014</u> passed the House last Friday. This version includes language that would block next school year's implementation of new science standards that require teaching students about global warming and removing "Common Core instructional strategies" by 2017-18. The bill now awaits action by the Senate Education Committee.

Salary Equity revamp fails to pass out of House

HB 4465 proposed to eliminate the current calculation for salary equity for school service personnel. By eliminating the current calculation, the legislature would have cut \$6 million from hard working service personnel across West Virginia. The bill was on 2nd reading, but was removed from the House floor. The bill was not addressed again, and did not pass out of the House before the crossover day deadline. **AFT-WV opposed HB 4465.**

Online lesson plans bill dies after outcry from educators

SB 681 called for teachers' lessons plans to be available on the Internet to student and parents. Over 20,000 people have viewed the SB 681 action item on AFT-WV's Facebook page. Thanks to your calls and emails, the bill died in the Senate Education Committee. **AFT-WV opposed SB 681.**

Two school Calendar bills still active

AFT-WV supports school calendars that provide thorough instructional time and allow local communities to develop calendars to fit their unique needs. Eng. Comm. Substitute for SB 313 changes mandatory school instructional time from 180 days to minutes and permits limited use of available accrued instructional time. The bill passed the Senate and awaits action by the House. HB 4171 calls for a school year that begins no earlier than August 10 and completes by June 10. It also permits the use of accrued instructional minutes to makeup up 8 days lost to inclement weather. The bill has passed the House and awaits action by the Senate.
